

Known by a number of common names, lemon beebalm is a 1-2+ ft., aromatic winter annual with unusual, tuft-like, lavender to pink, whorled flower heads. Each whorl in the elongated spike is subtended by whitish or lavender, leaf-like bracts. Several stems grow from the base and are lined with pairs of lance-shaped leaves.

Horsemint has a distinctive citrus or lemony scent when the leaves are rubbed or crushed. It is very easy to grow and often forms large colonies. Bees and butterflies are attracted to this plant.

Linnaeus named the genus Monardo in honor of a 16th century Spanish physician and botanist, Nicolas Bautista Monardos (1493-1588). Monardos studied medicinal plants brought back to Spain from the New World.

5-Minute No-Cook Zucchini Avocado Dip

Yield: 8 servings

Prep Time: 5 minutes

Cook Time: 0 minutes

Use as dip for veggies, use as sandwich spread or with "fixens" in wrap or pita

Ingredients

- ~1 medium raw zucchini, cut ends off, wash and roughly chop
- ~ 1 large ripe avocado, peeled and pitted
- ~ ¼ cup lemon juice
- ~ 1-3 cloves garlic, to taste
- [~] ½ teaspoon sea salt
- ~ 2 teaspoons cumin
- ~ ½ cup tahini
- ~ 1-3 tablespoons water, optional

Instructions

• Combine raw zucchini and avocado in a food processor or high-speed blender. Pulse a few times to chop them up well.

•Add the remaining ingredients to the food processor or blender. Run until the mixture has a smooth consistency. Scrape down the sides of the food processor or blender and run again.

- Taste and add more garlic, cumin, or salt if desired. Add water if desired, 1 tablespoon at a time, blending in between to reach desired consistency.
- Enjoy or store in fridge in an air tight container for up to 4 days.





Squash (yuk!!)

Ten to one, you wouln't go near it when you were a kid. Me neither. I'll guarantee you that you will love it if you use the attached recipe. *Especially if you grow it yourself*. You can grow the little "Yellow" squash or maybe try the larger "Patty Pan". The Patty Pan is often called the "flying saucer" squash. Both the yellow and white varieties taste the same. Enjoy the most delicious casserole you have ever eaten.

Summer Squash Casserole

<u>6 cups</u>	sliced yellow summer or patty pan squash or combo of both
<u>1/4 cup</u>	chopped onion
<u>1 can</u>	cream of chicken soup
<u>1 cup</u>	sour cream (can use lite)
<u>1 cup</u>	carrot, shredded
<u>1 8 oz pkg</u>	Pepperidge Farm cornbread mix
<u>1/4 - 1/2 cup</u>	melted butter

Cook sliced squash and onion in boiling water 5 minutes - drain Combine soup and sour cream - Stir in shredded carrot Combine squash/onions with sour cream mixture Combine stuffing mix and melted butter Spoon 1/2 the stuffing mix in the bottom of 9x12 baking pan Add squash mixture and sprinkle remaining stuffing over the top Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes until heated through.
