Four Herbs

The humble herb **parsley**, often used only as a garnish and discarded, is a <u>nutritional powerhouse</u>. Parsley is **rich in vitamins A, K, B, and C** and contains **more vitamin C than oranges**. It's also a great source of **calcium and iron**.

To <u>boost the immune</u> system, add fresh chopped parsley on top of your favorite savory dishes. It's a <u>mild diuretic</u>, so it supports kidney health.

Like many green plants, parsley is **rich in chlorophyl**, which helps fight off bad breath. If you enjoy foods heavily seasoned with garlic, try <u>chewing a few sprigs of fresh parsley after the meal to combat garlic breath.</u>

The Latin name for **sage**, Salvia (Salvia Officinalis), is related to the word salvus, which means "healthy", or salvare, "to save". It has been used for centuries to **ease indigestion from heavy meals**.

Sage has many benefits and deserves to be a regular part of your diet. Because of its **antibacterial properties**, sage infusion makes <u>a wonderful mouthwash or face wash</u> if you struggle with acne. It's also a <u>great gargle for a sore throat.</u>

Rosemary brings bright, slightly <u>woodsy flavor</u> to our combination. Medicinally, it has been used to improve <u>memory, relieve muscle pain and spasm, and support the circulatory and nervous system.</u>

Thyme has been highly regarded by herbalists for centuries. Thyme has been used as an <u>antiseptic and room deodorizer</u>. To this day, thyme is used to help ease <u>symptoms of respiratory illnesses</u>. It eases coughing and fever and also alleviates headaches. It was used to relieve asthma symptoms in medieval times.


ACROSS


